

## Chairman's Blog

Happy New Year to you all and a very warm welcome to all new members of our Scout Group. 2016 will see us celebrate 100 years of Cub Scouting and all



Hertfordshire Cub Scouts will be invited to a Cubs 100 camp in Tolmers July 1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup>. The Group and Scout Active Support will be assisting with this event so make a note of the date in your diaries. I mentioned a while back that we are planning our next Family Camp and this has provisionally been booked for Phasels Wood from 30<sup>th</sup> June-July 2<sup>nd</sup> 2017. I know it's a long way off but planning is already underway!

As you are all probably aware our front forecourt was successfully resurfaced during the October half term. This will help to keep the hall and lobby free from grit and eliminate the potholes and puddles that were constantly appearing in the old surface. The considerable cost of this project came from fundraising and I thank you all for supporting all of our fundraising events.

The Double Jumble sale in October raised £1291.00 and The Christmas Market in November £890.00 which included a £70.00 donation from Dot once again who managed to sell on 'high quality' items to her 'dealers'......well done Dot! Our next Double Jumble is scheduled for March 16<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> so start sorting out your cupboards now.

The Remembrance Day Parade in November was attended by 124 impeccably turned out uniformed members and our Christingle service at St Lawrence's Church in December raised £246.91 and this was donated to The Children's Society.



Storm Desmond blew in during December and caused damage to our flag pole which has subsequently been repaired and concerns were raised about large overhanging neighbouring trees which will be cut back in the springtime. Repairs and alterations were also carried out to the HQ guttering as they were permanently getting blocked and overflowing. Possible work to the soakaways may have to be carried out in due course as these seem to be silting up.

Towards the end of last year our Scout Group was asked to contribute to a local recipe book. I am pleased to announce that the book is now on sale at Over The Moon in the High Street and all proceeds go towards The St Lawrence Church Appeal.

Our annual fire drills were once again successfully carried out at the end of last term.

You may recall that during last year our Scout Group was involved with The Prince's Trust in a community project with local disadvantaged youngsters. I am pleased to announce that 6 of the 10 young people that carried out decoration work at the HQ have now gained full time employment and begun the process of reshaping their lives.


My heartfelt thanks go out to all of the volunteers who make scouting in Abbots Langley possible.

# **Scout Cooking Competitions**

For the District competition myself, my brother Joe and Andrew Bell formed a team to take part in the cooking competition. The theme was South America and we had to create a 3 course menu for 4 people to be cooked and served using camping equipment with a 2 hour time limit with an £18 budget.

We researched the traditional food in South America and decided for our starter to cook Plantain balls filled with mozzarella. We had to boil the plantain first and then mash it with a fork and then make and fill the balls and then fry them.

For our main course we decided to boil ribs in water, soy sauce and lots of herbs and spices.

We boiled the ribs until the sauce reduced. To go with the ribs we cooked rice and black eye beans. I was very pleased with the presentation as I filled a small cup with the rice and turned it out to make a rice castle which looked really effective.



For pudding we made caramel and banana pancake stacks with caramel sauce and cream, it was delicious!

The challenge was to serve all 3 courses at the same time and make sure that they were hot and served on a nicely laid table.

Last years County Green Beret competition took place on the 13th-15th November. It was a great experience as it tested our skills, teamwork and fitness. On the Friday we arrived at the camp and unloaded all our kit from the minibus, only to find, that we were camping on the far side of the camp. So after a long walk in the dark we arrived at the part of the camp that our troop was camping on. We put up our tents, had dinner, unpacked and then went to sleep.





In the morning we had breakfast then discussed our tactics in the teams we had been put in. I was in the team Abbos A, which consisted of me, Aidan Cheng, Hannah Trotman, Lucy Packman, Charlotte Clark and Roselyn Chase. After breakfast, we rushed to the day activities so that we could try and get as many done as possible. In order for the scores from all the bases to count we had to do at least 10 bases and if you did more than 10 bases only the 10 highest scoring activities would be counted. The first base we went to was a Kim's game, in this activity we had to memorise 20 objects in I minute and repeat them after they were covered up. We used good teamwork in this activity and as a result we got the full 50/50 marks. On another base, we had to move 4 different size tyres over 4 poles, but the catch was that a bigger tyre couldn't go on a smaller tyre. We also got full marks on this base as we completed it in a record time.

After we had finished the bases we went to the assault course which wrapped around the whole of the campsite. The course had six different bases that all had a balance of fitness and teamwork included in them. One of the bases that I enjoyed was having to run either under, over or through different obstacles that had been made out of wood. Our team was very good at this base as we all had good fitness.

After we had finished the course we went and washed off as much mud as possible, as some of the bases on the assault course required us to crawl through thick mud. After dinner we had about an hour to relax until we went to do the night activities from 7 – I I pm. A lot of the night bases we did were to do with general knowledge and puzzles as they were a very easy way to get points. We did several of these quiz's then we went and did a physical activity. This was called whack-a-mole, where we had to swing a ball that was suspended on a rope, so that we could try and knock down 10 crates in as few swings as possible. We, again, did very well on this activity as some of us did it in under 4 swings.

After we had done the night activities we went back to camp and went straight to bed because of how worn out we all were. In the morning we woke up at 7.30 so that we could get ready for the presentation that was happening on the Sunday morning. We had breakfast then went to the presentation that every scout troop attended. Although we didn't win any awards we came 3<sup>rd</sup> in Night Exercises and 19<sup>th</sup> overall. The best feeling was that we completed the weekend with a good final score and our B team also did well, coming 100<sup>th</sup> out of 146 teams. It was a great experience and I would recommend it to anyone.

Other favourites sung are Pete Linskey's music man, performed in a variety of ways each year by Steve Flowers (in his 36<sup>th</sup> year), who inherited this honour after Pete died. A rousing chorus of Jerusalem is sung along the way, producing a tear or two in pride and remembrance. And it wouldn't be the same if we didn't have a few "Oggy's" and "Bravos" along the way started by Kevin Fancourt (on his 37<sup>th</sup> consecutive walk).


# A BIG CONGRATULATIONS...

# Cynthia Mary Botwright nee Killminster 1st September 1937 to 25 December 2015



With regret I have to report that Cynthia Botwright passed away peacefully on Christmas Day, surrounded by her family. Cynthia moved to Bushey in 1956 from Bournemouth and was introduced into Cubs by a friend. She held a warrant as ACM at the 48th South West Herts pack for two years and it was at the Cracknell Shield competition in 1957 that she met Alan, who was a Club Leader in our Group at the time. Cynthia and Alan married on 28th March 1959 in Christchurch, Hampshire and the Group presented them with a barometer as a wedding present.

Alan was the Cub Leader of the 'B' Pack of the 44th South West Herts Group, as we were called at the time. As in many a "Scouting" marriage, Cynthia was true to form and took out a warrant as the Assistant Cub Leader three months after their wedding at the 44th. In the latter 1960s she moved to the 1st Apsley Scout Group as Cub and then Assistant Cub Leader.
