WORLD SCOUT JAMBOREE ACTIVITY UPDATE

On December 1st and 2nd 2001 the Hertfordshire Contingent competed in the legendry Welwyn Garden City night exercise. Before the main event about ten of us decided to go to Roller City to have fun and get to know each other a bit better. There was a slight communication error; the Hut was not open until 5pm. As luck would have it one Dad was press-ganged into looking after the bags until nearer the time, then followed much entertainment in fitting all the bags into the car whilst leaving enough room for the driver.

We were all back at the Hut by 5.30 and this time it was open. We were asked to split into eight groups for briefing. Events started at 7pm. I was in the first group to leave for the start, a ten-minute drive away. At the start we passed the kit check and hit our first problem. A telephone call sorted out the lack of health forms and we were on our way. Navigation and Teamwork were all important, and we learnt this within the first 800 meters because we turned left instead of right!

There were activity bases along the walk, our most memorable being identifying food by smell and guessing the weight and measurements of objects like a stave, cone and brick.

Being the first group back we secured prime sleeping positions. The last group arrived two hours after us and with about eighty packed like sardines we decided we couldn't sleep so we talked until goodness knows when. In the morning we were delighted to find that we came in the top four.
