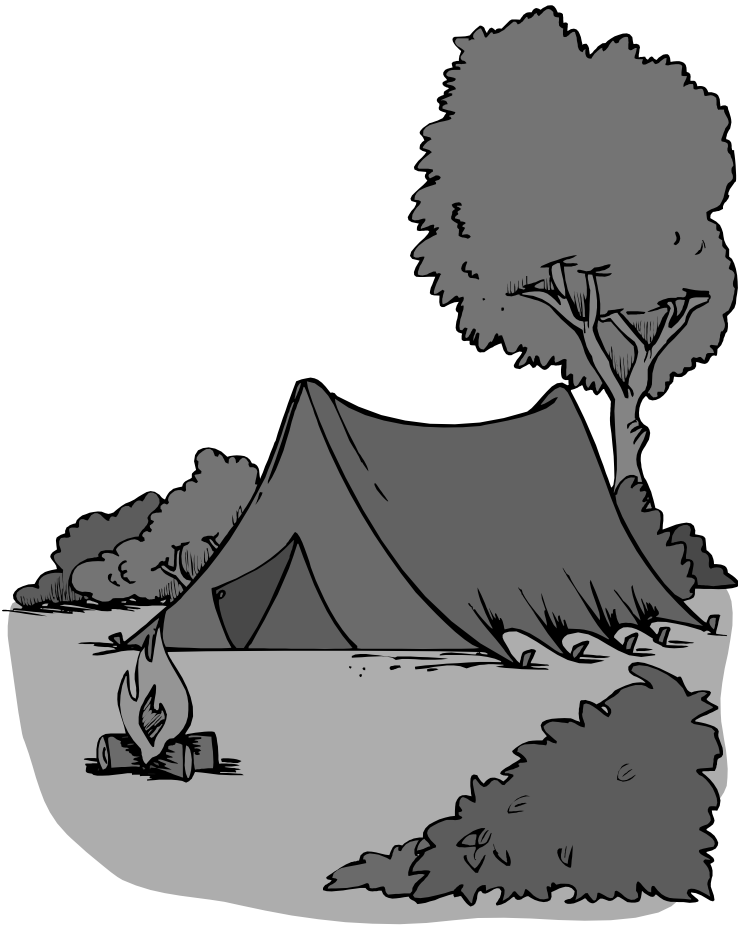

GROUP SCOUT LEADER & SCOUT LEADER ANNUAL REPORT 2010

At the 2010 census in January the total Group membership was 112 (2009 = 87) a 29% increase. The individual section numbers were:

Beaver Scouts	26 (18)
Cub Scouts	34 (26)
Scouts	37 (35)
Leaders & Assistants	15 (8)

The addition of the new Beaver Colony last year obviously helped to grow the total numbers. However, I limited these initially to enable the new leaders of the Lake Beaver Colony, Lisa Sharpe and Caroline Hubble, to find their feet and also because we still only had one Cub Pack that has a maximum of 36 permitted. Beavers continued to enjoy a balanced programme of activities. Helen Welch, the Beaver Leader, of the renamed River Beaver Colony, again did a marvellous job assisted by Lyn Lythaby, and Julia Wood and Alisha Lian-Falvey, our new ABSLs. Their weekly programmes have enabled them to complete a huge number of the Challenges and activity badges as well as participating in a Giant Sleepover of over 40 Beavers including hosting Beavers from the around the District. They also had great success by winning the District Handicraft Trophy, the District Beaver Bangers competition for the 2nd year in succession and the Award for the Best Walking Group at the village carnival. Now that we have opened a second Cub Pack I have been able to increase the Beaver numbers to over 40. Both

Colonies are also well supported by a growing number of Young Leaders with 3 assisting each Colony. Some of these have come through the Group ranks with others asking to carry on helping after they have completed the Service section of their Duke of Edinburgh Award.

The Cub Section has also grown from strength to strength with the recent addition of the new Jungle Cub Pack in February under the Leadership of Cheryl Gillibrand and Victoria Caplan. The Leaders of the existing Pack, renamed the Rainforest Cub Pack, Chris Frith and Holly Noonan, have benefited from the valuable addition of our new ACSL, Nicola Trotman. Along with our Young Leaders, Chris Watts and Jonathan Benson, and valuable assistance from the parents, the Cubs have been kept extremely busy and entertained. The Cubs have continued their success with regard to Challenge Awards and Activity Badges. There were also successes in the District events with victory in the District Quiz, Volleyball and Chess Tournaments. My congratulations particularly go to the 8 boys who completed their Silver Chief Scouts Award in 2009. This has continued into 2010 and I'm pleased to say that 3 more Cubs completed their **Silver Award** last term.

The Scouts completed a total of 51 Challenge Awards throughout the year (38 in 2008) and numerous Activity Badges. I would particularly like to congratulate the 7 Scouts who completed their Gold Chief Scouts Award. Again, I'm pleased to say that we have had another **Gold Award** completed last term. My thanks go to my fellow leaders, Tony Dabson, Sharon Duffy, Jason Gearhart, Jack McCarthy and Alison Redmond, and our Young Leaders, Dominic Benson, Daniel Lowrie, Tom and Marc Redmond and Christopher Winder for their commitment and hard work throughout the year, and to the parents who have helped and supported the activities.

The Troop continued to support the District and County events and again continued their success with almost a clean sweep of the District competitions in 2009. The Scouts won the District Cooking

Competition, the District Night Owls Trophy for the third year running, the District Swimming Gala and the District Triathlon competition. The Scout of the Year Award also proved to be a hard fought battle. This is awarded to the Scout who shows the most commitment to the annual parades, competitions and fundraising events and for their overall Scouting ability. The winner this year would never live it down in his household if he didn't bring this trophy home particularly as his 2 brothers have been previous winners. **The winner is Greg Benson.**



I'm pleased to say that the success of the Troop is due to having such a strong leadership team. The Troop has had 40 Scouts for some years and remains over-subscribed, with 11 on the waiting list. Last year, those on the waiting list would have had a very slim chance of joining. However, I'm pleased to report that we are now planning to open our second Scout Troop, later this year or early next, under the leadership of Jason Gearhart and David Goodman.

As mentioned above, the Group is highly successful and, although the census number of 112 shows a huge 29% increase on the previous year, the numbers for 2010 have continued to explode. We currently have 151 in the Group, excluding the Young Leaders, which highlights the continued need for a decent number of adult Leaders. I'm also pleased to see more parents getting involved, not that we give them much choice.

I'm also pleased that Albatross, the District Explorer Scout Unit hosted by this Group, continues to be strong and James Harris and Rob Lambert have done a marvellous job as the Unit leaders. I would also like to thank those Explorers who help out with the other sections on a weekly basis. Long may it continue.

2009 was the centenary of when the Group was first formed. The main event for the youngsters was the Herts 100 camp at Tolmers attended by most scout groups in the county to celebrate 100 years of scouting in Hertfordshire. No less than 70 youngsters from our group attended and had a great time. I would like to thank all the organisers, leaders, Fellowship members and parents for making it a tremendous weekend. There is a lot of time and effort that goes into organising such a huge event but this was made considerably easier by the involvement of you all. Special thanks to the Catering team of Pauline, Rachel and Sarah for keeping us all well fed and watered. It was also very encouraging to see so many parents get involved, most for the first time, and I hope this will continue in the future.

In October, the Group held its Centenary Dinner at Hunton Park attended by over 100 people associated with the Group past and present, young and old. My thanks to Aisling and Michael Benson, Rachel Drake, Rob Sheppard and Pauline Styles for organising and running such a superb event that was enjoyed by all. Many have asked that it becomes an annual event.

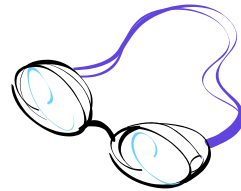

Swimming Gala 2010

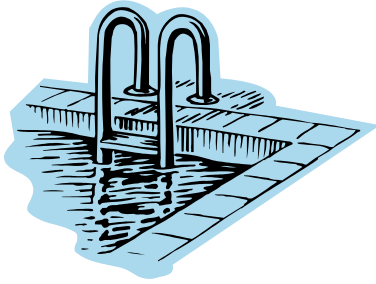

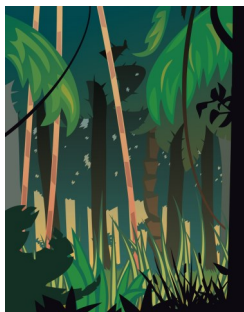
What a tremendous effort by all concerned - thanks a bunch. As always we owe a big thanks to Paul Hanson for supplying the sausages and use of his van.

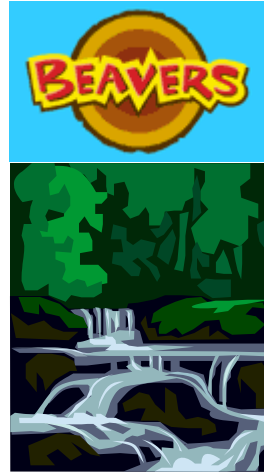
