

#### AGM May 15th 2015 - Chairman's Report

It is with great sadness that I have to report the sad loss this year of some great friends of Abbots Langley Scouts. Anne Wiseman, Mary Hunt, Joan Floyd and Kath Turner were all members of the Ladies Guild and they will be greatly missed by us all. The Ladies Guild is



primarily parents of past scouts who are part of the backbone of this Group and play a key role in all of our fundraising activities. Their collective effort in supporting the Group is commendable and has helped shape us into the thriving organisation that it is today so if you want to roll up your sleeves and help at the Jumble Sales, Christmas Market or the Carnival then talk to Lin Lythaby ... The year's fundraising got off to a great start with £1830.00 being raised at the Carnival with over 1200 sausages being cooked and eaten on the day. The Jumble sales raised £2800.00 and the Christmas Market brought in £1264.00 making a grand total of £5894.00. As you can imagine this money doesn't come easy and a lot of hard work and fun, I might add, is put into these activities to make it all happen and my sincere thanks go out to all of the volunteers that help with this Group — we couldn't manage without you. I hope you can join us at this year's Carnival on Saturday June  $13^{th}$ .

We had a fantastic family camp at Phasel's Wood in June with over I50 people attending. My thanks go to the organising committee who worked tirelessly to ensure that everyone was fed and entertained over the three days and a special thank-you to Pauline who fronted the whole event. I believe Pauline is about to set the date for the next camp so keep your diary free!

The Scouts had their Summer Camp in July and went to Bishops Lydeard in Somerset and, as always, everyone had a fantastic time.

Our Active Support Members who also support the Group at Camps, Green Beret and Fundraising, work tirelessly to ensure these events are successful. They also have a social diary too and in October 20 members stayed at a lodge in The Forest Of Dean and a superb time was had by all. Other events organised included Bowling, American and Casino Nights and various walks including the traditional Boxing Day walk and sing-song which 22 members took part and I believe is in its 65<sup>th</sup> year .... quite a milestone.

We were dealt a blow in October when our tired heating system gave up on us and this meant we were unable to heat the building properly. I would like to thank all hall users for being so patient whilst our Executive Committee discussed the best way to solve the problem. So in January at a cost of £6000.00 a new system was installed and we are now up and running again. I would personally like to thank the kind lady who hearing of our heating dilemma whilst attending the October Jumble Sale donated £500.00 to the heating fund. This certainly shows our community spirit at its very best. We are continuing to update the HQ wiring and lighting circuits and hope to have the front drive re-surfaced in the near future. We have been in discussion with The Princes Trust about some extensive decoration work, and this is being completed this week.

The Remembrance Day service in the village was very well attended with a record 145 uniformed members turning out on a cold, crisp morning - well done to you all. The Annual Christingle service was a huge success with £208.00 being donated to a children's charity. My thanks go to all of the volunteers who painstakingly put together the hundreds of oranges and dolly mixtures that are required for the event to take place.

The Group Magazine Woodsmoke , is a hugely popular publication which is now in its 222<sup>nd</sup> edition and we took the steps last year to produce an on-line version to reduce escalating printing costs. It seems to be going well at the moment and a big thank-you must go to Pauline Styles for editing the magazine and the contributors who take the time to write the articles for it.

Last year we took the steps of up-dating our website and with the help of lain Stanley, one of our ex-scouts, the new site is now up and running and can be viewed at abbotslangleyscouts.org where you can get all the latest group information, archive material and group photos. There is also a shop where you can purchase camping equipment and access to a uniform bank where nearly new uniforms can be obtained. I would urge you all to take a look. My thanks go to the team that helped lain, namely Martin, Holly and Pauline.....Thank-you.

We had some special events in September and November to support Clive's Jamboree units fundraising. A great time was had by all at The Real Ale and Wine Festival and my thanks go to Alison Redmond for organising the quiz night and Dave and Yvonne Collette for being Quiz Masters. I would like to end by wishing Clive the very best of luck as unit leader at the World Scout Jamboree in Japan this summer. I know he has had a lot of hurdles to jump and a few more still to go but the end is in sight and I am sure he will have a great time when he is there. Don't forget all you leaders amongst us, you need to book Clive in now to talk about his Jamboree experiences at your section meetings... I think he could be rather busy when he returns!

## GROUP SCOUT LEADER & SCOUT LEADER ANNUAL REPORT 2015

The total Group membership at the 2015 Census was 165 (2014 = 130), a 27% increase, mainly due to the new Lagoon Beaver Colony. The individual section numbers are:

Beaver Scouts	63 (30)
Cub Scouts	46 (45)
Scouts	33 (33)
Leaders & Assistants	23 (22)

Unfortunately, we have had to say goodbye to three members of our leadership team. Cheryl Gillibrand has stepped down as Akela of Jungle Cubs, leaving the section in dire need of assistance, and Alice Swaine-Gray and Christopher Winder have both moved out of the area. My thanks to them all for all their hard work over the years, but particularly to Cheryl who was instrumental in helping to launch our 2<sup>nd</sup> Cub Pack without which, many children would not be able to enjoy scouting. Also, many congratulations to Alice and Chris Watts on the birth of their son, Noah, who is already on the Beaver Waiting List. This now stands at 150 of which 24 are overdue. We also have 17 on the Cub Waiting List.

Thankfully we had some new recruits in 2014. Amaelia Parmenter became ABSL & ASL after being a Young Leader for 4 years. Chris Watts returned from Uni to join Rainforest Cubs and Kuldip Malhotra will be helping out at River Beavers. Liam Goodman and Jeremy Cannock have also progressed from being Young Leaders to Adult Leaders this year.

Helen Welch, the River Beaver Leader, Lisa Sharpe, the Lake Beaver Leader and Hollie Goodman, the Lagoon Beaver Leader, did a tremendous job of providing an excellent programme of activities ably assisted by ABSLs Paula Gomme, Alix Dunstone and Amaelia Parmenter, and of course, Lyn Lythaby. The Beavers attended District events such as the Beaver Bonanza, Christmas Party, Swimming Gala, coming 3<sup>rd</sup>, and the Handicraft Competition, which they won. They also held a Sleepover at the HQ for all 3 Colonies. Each Colony has achieved an impressive number of awards and badges during 2014, with River Beavers attaining 29 Challenge Awards and 51 Activity Badges, Lake Beavers completing 30 Challenge Awards and 92 Activity Badges and Lagoon, 43 Challenges and 119 Activity Badges. We have had an explosion of Bronze Chief Scouts Awards this year with another 15 to present. 
