

#### Scouting for Boys ..... Scouting for Life

It was nearly 40 years ago that I joined the 1<sup>st</sup> Kingsbury cub pack. Like thousands of boys, and now girls before and since, I joined because I wanted to be with my friends from school and have fun. What I did not know when I turned up at that draughty church hall all those years ago was that the club I was about to join would

I went through the usual Scouting path, became a sixer of the yellows and achieved the Leaping Wolf (for younger reader's ask an older member of the group what the Leaping Wolf was); became a scout and eventually a Patrol Leader of the Wolf patrol. Won the Chief Scouts Award and then because we did not have a Venture Scout unit, I became a leader.

Today, I am Chairman of Abbots Langley Parish Council and the approach I bring to that job is based on the foundations for life that Scouting taught me. So what did Scouting teach me that has helped me in life and as Chairman of the Parish Council?

When all of us took our Promise when we were invested we promised to "do our duty to God and to the Queen". When I used to enrol new Scouts into the movement I used to stress that duty to the Queen meant to be good citizens of our country. Scouting has always been intertwined with involvement in the local community, so I suppose becoming involved with the Parish Council is just an extension of doing what I said I would do when I made my Promise.

Being a sixer and patrol leader gave me my first insights of leading teams of people. None of us can achieve anything in this world on our own and my six and my patrol are just like the Parish Council, a team where we all work together to make, in the case of the Council, Abbots Langley a better place to live.

In working life managers go on all sorts of courses to try to make them better leaders, but for me the most important leadership course I ever went on was the Patrol Leader's Training Course, which taught me how to work with people and lead teams. Chairing the Parish Council meeting is not so different from chairing a Patrol Leaders Council.

Scouting taught me lots of other things which have held me in good stead through my life; I got my first taste of being able to repair my car through when I took my mechanics badge. When I did my House Orderly badge as a cub and in the scouts I learnt to cook meals at camp, little did I know that it would teach me things about looking after my home; and nowadays looking after a home and cooking is not just mum's job, but is something boys need to know as well. So really all through my Scouting life I was learning things that at the time seemed pretty useless, but are of great value now. Things that they don't teach you at school, like knots and pioneering; which now is a great help when I am building a wigwam for growing beans in the garden!

But the most important thing I gained from Scouting was friendship. Some of my oldest friends are people I first met when I was in the cubs and scouts and through my involvement in the Scout movement I have made friends with people from all over the country. These are people who shared the good time of my Scouting adventure with me and we can now look back together on the wonderful times and fun we had; they are also people who help me out nowadays when times get tough or who I can help when they are in trouble. That is what the brotherhood of Scouting means.

I think it was the founder, Baden-Powell who invited young people to play the "Game of Scouting" and as you, the current generation of cubs and scouts at 1<sup>st</sup> Abbots Langley play that game I hope you have as much fun as I did; make lots of friends who will last your lifetime and learn a few things that you will help you in later life. After all in 30 or 40 years time, who know, you may be a Chairman of a local Council.

That is why Scouting is not just for boys (or girls), but really is for life.
