Although Keith was a local boy, born in the Village, he did not enter the Scout movement until he was about 12 years old. He then joined the Scout troop under GSL Frank 'Skip' Hoadley. He then progressed through Senior and Rover Scouts until he became a Cub Leader in 1953 at the age of 19.

Keith always involved himself in many leisure activities, being a Sunday School teacher for more than 30 years. He also had a strong connection with the R.N.L.I. as well as with many local groups such as the British Legion. Nevertheless, his main focus of attention was Scouting, and in 1967 after the death of Frank Hoadley, Keith took on the role of Group Scout Leader. In 1997 Keith was very proud of the fact that he had completed 50 years in the movement and to mark the anniversary he attended a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace.

Unfortunately Keith passed away in April last after living with cancer for the past few years. He did a very good job for Scouting in Abbots Langley and we shall long remember him.
