

2014 SUMMER CAMP

his year's Summer Camp was in Bishop Lydeard, in Somerset. This was my third camp and the other two had been great. It took three and a half hours to reach the hilly campsite and we pitched our tents soon after arriving, ready for six days of exciting activities.

On Sunday we were split into four groups. Two of the groups would do caving and climbing on Sunday, and on Monday they would go kayaking and mountain biking. The other 2 groups did the opposite. When we went caving we ventured down a cave known as Goat Church. It featured many tricky passages, such as the keyhole, the coffin lid and the letterbox. Even though it was very tight only one person got themselves painfully stuck. The climbing featured four walls, each varying in difficulty. We got into groups of three and everyone was assigned a different role: the climber, the belayer and the bucket monkey. We rotated our roles.

The other activities were kayaking and mountain biking. When kayaking, we came across many small drops and strong currents. With Dave and Sue's supervision, everything went well. Mountain biking was one of the week's most challenging activities. The route we took featured many steep hills, forcing us to push our bikes up quite a way. It took a considerably larger amount of time to reach the highest point than it did to descend from it. We rested at camp for a short while and then visited Taunton swimming pool.

On Tuesday everybody went on a hike around the Quantock Hills. It was not a very long hike (12.8 km) and groups hiked either anti-clockwise or clockwise. This hike featured different terrains, such as roads and forests. When we returned Clive and Alison set up a water slide in camp

and we had a great time running and sliding along some plastic sheeting. It was a great way of relaxing and cooling down. Wednesday was a day in camp with the Scouts learning how to construct bivouacs and make and cook on fires. Later we went shopping in Taunton.

Thursday marked our second and longest hike (14.5 km), during which everybody hiked from Dunkery on Exmoor to Dunster on the coast. This route was very hilly and difficult to traverse. But perhaps the most challenging section of the hike was the small forest during which nearly every group got lost. At the end was Dunster. My group arrived first but shopped for 30 minutes and therefore did not finish ahead of the others. To get back to camp, everybody got on a steam train (one group missed it and actually got a diesel engine instead).

Friday was the last day of activities. The older ones went sailing in the morning and the younger group did rifle shooting and archery and then we switched at lunch. The sailing was difficult as the boom kept swinging around everywhere and it was a windy day. On the way back to camp, Alison somehow ended up taking us to Devon. My group could only do rifle shooting as it was very wet on the archery range. That evening it was the banquet, a delicious three course meal where many toasts were made to things that happened on camp. The games that followed included the matchstick blowing contest and the doughnut eating game. On Saturday we broke camp, after having put away all of the equipment. The journey back took four hours, but we eventually arrived. Everyone joined in putting back all of the things we took on camp.

Thank you to Tony, Neil and Ed for making the excellent food, to Alison, Jason, Dave, Daniel and all the other leaders who helped out with the activities; and of course to Clive, for organising such a superb camp.
