

The Prince's Trust

Back in May I was contacted by Peter Cargill, a member of the Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service, about a project he was undertaking on behalf of the Prince's Trust. The Prince's Trust is a registered charity set up by HM The Prince of Wales several years ago aimed at delivering educational, activity, community and work placement programmes to help improve the lives of disadvantaged youngsters. The Herts Fire Service had set up a team to help plan and instigate these programmes aimed at youngsters from the Watford area.

The twelve youngsters involved were aged between 17 and 23, all long term unemployed and with basic qualifications. Some of the youngsters were from very troubled backgrounds, including being homeless. The programme lasted for twelve weeks and consisted of classroom sessions working on CVs, personal statements, help with basic Maths and English and communication improvement sessions. There was a recreational week spent camping at Phasel's doing abseiling, potholing and orienteering, followed by a work placement period with local employers and a community project.

It was with this community project that Ist Abbots Langley Scouts became involved. The team offered to spend ten days carrying out basic maintenance and decoration works to the building hoping to instil some structure, achievement and pride in the youngsters' lives that none had experienced before. The funding for the project was provided by two gruelling weeks of bag packing which the Prince's Trust volunteers carried out at local supermarkets.

The ten days spent at HQ were quite eventful and the

senior team's patience (Joanne, Lara, Peter and Dan) was severely tested at times!

Work undertaken was the redecoration of the office and Cubs' room upstairs (last done in 1975!) and re-laying of carpet tiles, below dado rail re-painting in the main hall, damp-proofing to external plinth, re-painting of the external doors and a coat of paint given to the flagpole and driveway gate.

I met with the youngsters several times over the ten days and gradually got to know them and witnessed first-hand how well they were beginning to get to know each other and work as a team. Their time keeping skills and the ability to follow instructions improved over time and they all began to take pride in their work - something I suspect many have never had the opportunity to achieve before.

The week ended with a small presentation at HQ and a



scout flag hoisting ceremony where a few youngsters were awarded special certificates for outstanding achievements over the course of the week. To show their appreciation the whole team awarded our

scout group a special recognition certificate for giving them the opportunity to carry out their community project and discover talents and skills that none of these youngsters thought they had ever had before.

The whole programme came to a close in July, when

myself, my wife Aisling and Lin Lythaby, a long standing member of our group, represented the Group at a Prince's Trust area presentation function at Hunton Park, where all of the team were present along with many dignitaries from the Herts Fire and Rescue Service and other community organisations involved with the project.

It was a very humbling experience as each young person stood up in front of the audience and explained their very difficult lives so far and how the Prince's Trust has helped them to forge new positive paths in their lives. They all expressed their sincere gratitude to Ist Abbots Langley Scouts for the help that we had given to them to achieve this and I was very proud on behalf of Abbots Scouts to have been of assistance in a very small way.

As one area Commander said at the presentation, "the most difficult day ahead is the first Monday after the programme has finished."



That's when these youngsters have to move forward with the skills they have learnt so far and achieve their goals for themselves. We wished them all the very best of luck for the future and urged them all to try hard not to drift back to the lives that they had before.

After breakfast which involved bacon, eggs and sausage (thanks again Alison) and we set about our tasks as we headed back towards Abbots Langley. It started to rain a lot so we rushed inside while Mike opened the lock

and Clive steered the boat in. After it stopped raining we all got out to help with the locks, there were quite a few.

On arriving back at Hunton Bridge we moored the boat and took all the stuff off so we were ready to be collected and taken home.

It was a great weekend and I enjoyed it a lot. Thank you to all the adults that helped over the weekend and to my mum for making my favourite cakes to take and for buying giant marshmallows too.

GREEN BERET CHALLENGE

The Green Beret Challenge is a full day competition for Scouts from all over Hertfordshire. The late Bryan Sharpe,



Hertfordshire. The late Bryan Sharpe, former Group President was one of the founders of the competition. It is designed to test teams of 6 Scouts over a range of physical and intellectual activities. It also proves to be a significant challenge to their leadership and team work skills.

Abbots Langley Scout Group have supported this event for over 40 years. We will once again be providing a challenging assault course consisting of a series of elevated walkways and a final vertical pole slide. The assault course is erected on a Saturday morning in advance of the event. This involves collecting the various equipment from HQ Stores, loading it into the minibus and delivering it to site where the various elements have then to be assembled. On the day of the event, which this year is Saturday 14th November successive teams of Scouts negotiate the course at roughly 15 minute intervals. Over 100 teams are expected to take part in the event. Once the final Scout Teams have completed the course it is dismantled and the materials returned to HQ.

Setting up and running the base does involve a lot of time and physical labour. The reward is in seeing Scouts overcoming their initial fear, giving each other encouragement and their obvious sense of relief and of achievement upon completing the course. Abbots Langley Scout Active Support have committed to this event but would like to invite all parents, members and friends of Abbots Langley Scout Group to give some of their time to help us with the day. It will also provide an opportunity for us to pass on the store of knowledge surrounding this event and help ensure that the Group's involvement is maintained for the future.
