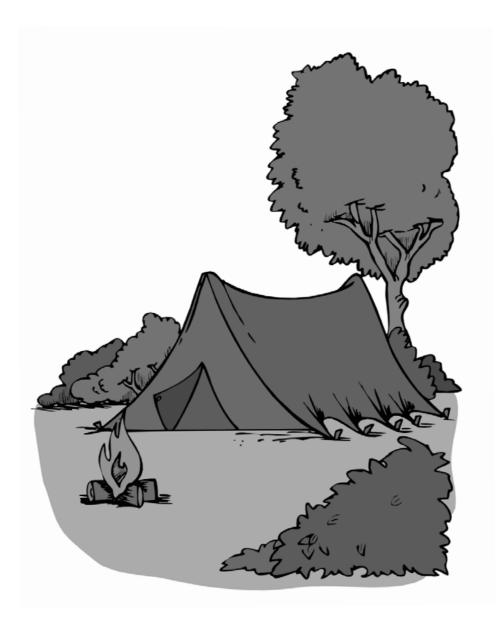

### Chairman's Blog

I would like to begin by giving you all a warm welcome at the beginning of this new term with a special welcome to all the new members who have joined our Scout Group. Exciting times are ahead for you all.



What a magnificent Summer it was! Our solar panels thought so, too, with £883.00 being raised from the feed-in-tarrif.

June saw our annual participation in The Village Carnival - cooking sausages and burgers, serving teas and cakes, smashing plates and selling bric-a-brac. This busy event raised a staggering £3,900.00! It was one of our best fundraisers ever and those who volunteered should be very proud of themselves and this magnificent achievement. Well done!

Fundraising is essential as the running costs of the HQ are considerable. As well as the day to day running costs, a number of expensive jobs have been carried out in recent months. Fire alarms have been replaced, heating, gas appliances and fire extinguishers have been serviced and we have purchased and installed a defibrillator device. We have also funded many training courses which our leaders have attended. I am pleased to announce that the grant application for a new mini-bus from The West Herts Charity Trust has been approved. We are contributing £10,000 towards its purchase. Well done, Clive, for succeeding with the application. The Mini-bus will serve our group for many years to come.

In late June, our Cubs attended the District Camp at Lees wood and the Scouts were away for a week in July down in Somerset.

In May and September commemorative walks took place around the village to discover the history of 'The Tommies' who lived in Abbots Langley and fought in The Great War. Refreshments at HQ were provided by the Ladies Guild and Active Support and Pauline and Rachel had also organised a display of in depth information about our Scouts who went to war. This made fascinating reading and was a huge contribution to the history of Scouting in Abbots Langley. Well done Ladies. You can read more about this later on in this issue.

There is a further WW1 talk at HQ on Friday October 5<sup>th</sup> at 7-30pm. Please make every effort to attend.

October  $10^{\text{th}}$  and  $13^{\text{th}}$  are the dates for the Double Jumble sale, so start sorting all of your quality unwanted jumble items now and donate them to your Scout Group.

We had another successful parent maintenance day in July and another is planned for Saturday November 10<sup>th</sup>. Our annual fire drills will also take place in November, after half term.

## **Summer Camp 2018**

Bishops Lydeard, Taunton, Somerset



We boarded the minibuses and waved goodbye to our families knowing that the journey had begun! The aim was to arrive at Bishops Lydeard Scout Campsite by late afternoon and we had a quick stop half way through the journey to arrive at 4pm. We were all weary due to the long, tedious journey but relieved that we had arrived safely and we were keen to explore, as we were filled with excitement. We had no parents, no annoying siblings and no school to worry about!! As a team we all helped unload the minibuses and then pitched our tents. Next, in groups of four or five we started our own small fire then put a barbeque camping grill over the top and when the fire was hot enough, we cooked burgers, sausages and chicken and sizzled some onions too. We placed the food into rolls and that was our dinner. We were given a slice of cheese to add to the burger which was very tasty!! After that, we lit the campfire and following some late-night gossiping, we all fell asleep eventually.

The next day we awoke eager for what the day would bring! My group was allocated the activities of bivouacking and kayaking. We devoured breakfast rapidly then stayed at the campsite for the bivouacking, which was a new experience for most of us. We headed to the woods to build and we had to search for an area that had lots of space and ample room to construct a shelter. We had to explore and roam the site and woodland for various things such as twigs, branches, leaves, ferns, rope and waterproof plastic tarpaulin ground sheets. Subsequently, we built our bivouac with these materials and secured it all together with the rope, which we hoped would hold it in place!!!! Our bivouac was finished within 3 hours and substantial for 4 people. That night we slept in them, but the location it was pitch black and frightening!!

Before we went to sleep we were screaming and laughing at each other as there was a spider on someone's roll mat, a snail on my sleeping bag and a slug on another person's! However, it was a beautiful, peaceful, calm but chilly night. The next activity

of the day was kayaking and before we set off we ate lunch at the campsite and Samuel and Daniel were getting chased by wasps!! After lunch we hopped onto the minibus. The river was glistening with the reflection of the scorching sun. we went down fast-flowing rapids. Fantastic time was had by all especially when people capsized including myself and when Amaelia's waterproof trousers ripped!!



The next morning, we were

woken up from a dreadful night's sleep by the sound of birds squawking, squirrels rustling through the trees and clear blue skies above us. I wouldn't do it again in a hurry!! We were excited for what the day would hold!! Climbing was our first activity on the list. As soon as we arrived we got kitted into our harnesses to tackle our challenge and had a short briefing. The rocks had grips but at other times no grips so you had to work the footing out for ourselves!! Some of it was hard because parts were just a flat surface where your feet could slip if you weren't careful, but the majority of us got to the top which was a great feeling and sense of achievement. We all abseiled back down. The next activity of the day was caving. Although I did not do the caving, other scouts did it and came out at the end saying that it was an enjoyable experience and they would do it again and recommend it to others who



had not done it before. While Lucy and I were waiting for the others to finish the caving, Neil's chair collapsed and when Dean fell asleep, we played human buckeroo on him which was well funny!!

On Tuesday, we woke from a pleasant night for our first expedition challenge of the week. It was a circular hike around the Quantock Hills in groups. My group consisted of Lucy, Emma R, Emma P and myself. During the hike, we were singing songs and listening to music



while looking at the stunning view ahead of us. Also, we saw wild horses and various types of birds flying around. We had to walk up and down hills and paths that had loose stones and rocks so we had to make sure we didn't trip over them. It wasn't just situated in the countryside as we walked on roads and went through a village, woods, and past cottages/houses, small rivers and farms. On the hikes, we had to take our rucksacks to carry essentials. The hike took roughly 3 hours to complete. My group wore trousers instead of shorts as there were stinging nettles and prickles that may hurt you. It was a boiling hot day and when we finished the hike, all of us were



dripping. Amaelia and Toby were leading my group. When we were back at camp, due to not washing for three days, we all started to whiff a little, so Clive decided we should go swimming! This was very refreshing and cooled us down from the heatwave. That afternoon, our phones were handed out so we could call our parents and check our messages. After that we had tent inspection, so we all rushed back to make sure our tents were tidy!!

Fifth day in camp and today we did survival and camping skills. We learnt how to whittle a piece of wood using our pen knives and make a fire. For survival we learnt how to tie knots, navigate and read a compass. For camping skills we learnt how to cook outdoors using food that is quick and easy to prepare. We had to prepare, make and cook our own meals including lunch, dinner and pudding. For lunch, my group collectively decided to make minced beef burritos. Dinner was pasta carbonara and we agreed to make apple fritters for dessert. First, we had to check with Tony what ingredients he had and each team had a budget of £12 to walk to the local shop to buy the rest of what we needed. Also, we had to come up with our own menus for two days with all the ingredients. We did this in teams of four, my team was made up of myself, Emma P, Emma R and Lucy. Later that day the whole Troop went shopping in Taunton town centre and went off in groups with a time and meeting point to come back to. There were lots of bargain shops, so we made the most of it and even bought a variety of refreshments and fizzy drinks! That evening, we had another camp fire. We roasted marshmallows and put them in between two digestive biscuits. Some of the adults fell asleep in their deck chairs!!

The following day (Thursday) we woke and hurriedly got dressed waiting for the day to start! Every day, the choices for breakfast was a selection of cereals and brown/ white toast with jam. Two mornings we had cooked breakfast! This was the day when us scouts completed the expedition challenge by trekking in groups from Dunkery on Exmoor to Dunster on the coast. This was a little longer than the one on

Tuesday and took 4 hours to complete. The terrain had a lot of steep hills but some of the footways and bridleways were level, but rocky and unbalanced in other places. This day was the hottest day of the week with temperatures rising up to 28 degrees. Again, we had our backpacks with our requirements. Half of the view on this hike was amazing because you could see the coast and the beautiful blue sea in the distance. The rest of the view was tall pine



trees and various other trees. My group leaders for this hike were Ros and Dean. When we ended the hike, all of us were tired and sweaty due to the lengthy walk. We finished the walk near a small village





with stalls and ice cream shops and because it was a scorching hot day the leaders treated us all to an ice cream!! After that, we caught a steam train to return to HQ on the 'West Somerset steam railway'. We were all seated on the steam train for an hour but worth it after burning off energy while hiking. It was very slow-moving and took ages to reach the destination but the seats were comfortable. When we reached the campsite, as it was so hot the adults got the slip n slide and a paddling



pool out for us to cool down. We filled up barrels of water in case we ran out of water but unfortunately one barrel fell on Toby's finger. Every night for dinner, we had different dishes - chilli con carne, pasta, beef stew, fish pie and one night we got to make pizzas with our own toppings to add! For last course we had jelly, ice-cream with sprinkled flake on top and chocolate mousse. Our mobile phones were given out so we could call our parents.



On Friday morning we went sailing, but sadly it started raining and became windy which affected us a little with the sails. None of us capsized and we had boat races and played Simon says! We wore wet suits for protection and after sailing we had a shower and felt clean again! Later on we did archery and rifle shooting. We were getting bulls eyes left, right and centre! That night we had the traditional camp banquet and

there were many great toasts, jokes and speeches delivered. We also played the usual camp games which I can't tell you about because it's a secret! We finished off with our final campfire, toasting marshmallows again! While sitting around the fire relaxing some of us took the opportunity to roll down the hill at two in the morning. We played card games and pranks in the tent every night. On the last night, we went to bed at 3.30am!

On the last morning, we woke in our tents to a storm, the thunder was rumbling loudly and the bright lightning was flashing in between the grey clouds. We heard hailstones popping on the tent and the rain "pitter and patter" on the ground. At one moment we thought the tent was going to blow away!! We spent Saturday





morning clearing away, packing our clothes and tidying up the tents. We had chip butties for lunch which was followed by flag break and badge presentation. We then all got on the minibuses and left the camp to head home. Most of us slept for the whole 4-hour journey due to the exhausting fun packed week we'd had.

A very big thankyou to all the Leaders, Active Support and other adults who ran the camp for us. We all had an absolutely amazing week which was enhanced by the glorious weather. This was my first summer camp and it won't be my last.

#### **Back to the Front - Great War Walks**



We had a

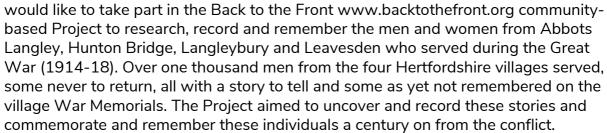
really good turnout for the
the Great War Walk on Monday 28th May,
where we served tea, coffee and cake back at
the Scout HQ where people could read about
the Scout Group of 1909 whose boys went off
to War as soon as they were old enough to

enlist.

It was so popular we held

it again on 9th September, and over the course of the two days we saw around 250 people and raised £328.

Early on in 2018 Roger Yapp approached the Abbots Langley Scout Group to see if we





We are fortunate enough to have a copy of Harold Robert Overy's note book, one of the first Abbots Langley Scouts, that he kept during 1909 to 1910 aged 14 and we were able to work through the copy and find names to begin identifying the boys in the troop at the time, who formed the humble beginnings of our Scout Group. Rachel worked

on the war records and genealogy and together we spent many hours on the project recording information about village life, Scouting at the time, where the Scouts would have lived, and their regiments.

The 15th June 2019 happens to be our Scout Groups Centenary, and we are hoping to celebrate this in some way - perhaps at the District Camp which will be held around this time at Lees Wood.

What we discovered was that:

**40 Scouts and Scout Leaders** went off to war. That is **everyone** in Overy's notebook we were able to identify and trace.

4 of them were Killed in Action, or died from their battle wounds

9 were wounded or invalided out

## and Wilfred Overy, the brother of Harold was a Prisoner of War

 but in true Scouting spirit even managed to write an article whilst in captivity on "the only Englishman who ever became Pope" which was printed in the British Prisoners of War publication The Rennbahn.



Many of these Scouts would have joined the Yeomanry when they were old enough and then joined up in the 1<sup>st</sup> World War as soon as they could.

It is a true testament to Scouting that gave them the grounding on which to survive the harshness of war, and amazing that so many of them survived

We are proud to have uncovered information to enable the Scout Association to add names to their Role of Honour for World War I.

I have now added another volume to the history of the Abbots Langley Scout Group, which has all the information on those Scouts who formed the first troop and you can read this in the history section of the Website www.abbotslangleyscouts.org.uk.

walking could be and how it is far more than just walking with poles!

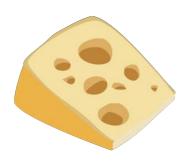
