

### 93<sup>rd</sup> AGM – 16<sup>th</sup> October 2020 Chairman's Report

In attendance was the District President, Roger Sands.

In the 111 years of our Group's history we find ourselves in one of our darkest hours as a result of Covid-19. As Scouts we have had to cope with many challenges over the last six months both here and around the country and indeed the World. The resumption of face to face scouting and some sort of normal life is still some way off.

The lack of fund-raising activities taking place has created an uncertain picture for us. Indeed The Scout Association in general, is facing a financial shortfall with an unclear future.

On a very personal level, back in March The Scout Group suffered a tragedy beyond words. The loss of our Group Scout Leader, Clive Winder, from Covid-19, aged 59 devastated us all. We are all still trying to come to terms with his absence. Clive was the backbone of our Group and since retiring twelve years ago, he devoted his life to Abbos and Scouting. He was a hugely active member of the District and County Teams and also led a contingency to the 2015 World Scout Jamboree in Japan. Only last year Clive attended a garden party at Buckingham Palace with his wife Sally, in recognition of his tireless commitment and voluntary work with the Scouts.

Clive has had a lasting impact on hundreds of young people who have passed through our Scout Group and many of our Young Leaders are testimony to his influence and direction which shaped so many of their lives.



Clive was not only our Group Scout Leader but a wonderful and dear friend to us all. We have all shared many camps and social activities together over the twenty-five years Clive was involved in Abbots Langley scouting and each of us have felt the impact of his sudden departure immensely. I am certain that everyone will cherish their own special memories of Clive and do their very best to live by even a few of their own things he stood for.

Our 2019 fundraising began with the Carnival and we raised nearly £2,000. The Jumble Sales in March and October totalled £2,600, the Christmas Market £1,100 and hall hire a further £2,000. Along with the £1,800 generated by the solar panels, the Group fundraising income total for 2019 was £9,500. This is a truly remarkable amount and would not be possible if it were not for the countless individuals who give up their time to make it happen. I sincerely thank you.

In June, the Group attended the District Camp at Lees Wood which was a huge success, helped by the glorious weather, and my thanks go to our camp committee and District organisers who made the whole event happen. The Scouts went to Matlock in Derbyshire for their summer camp and had a great time, despite the rain.

The Village Remembrance Service, in November, saw 118 uniformed members take part, with each section very well represented and impeccably turned out. December's Christingle service at St Lawrence's Church was very well attended and £429 was donated to The Children's Society. Twenty attendees took part in the 70<sup>th</sup> annual Boxing Day walk.

My congratulations go to Explorer Scouts, Ros and Alex Chase who attended The World Scout Jamboree in The USA during August. They had a fantastic time and greatly appreciated all those who participated in the March Quiz Night that supported them with their fundraising.

Our Group structure has undergone some recent changes. Our longstanding Woodsmoke Editor Pauline Styles, has, after sixteen years, now handed over the reins to a new parent Anna Ebden, whom I welcome to our Executive Committee and wish her luck with her new role.

My sincere thanks go to Pauline for her tremendous contribution to the Group's history and archive, for maintaining a record of all the scouting events for so many years, thank you.

I am pleased to say that Pauline has taken on a new role, as Group Treasurer, after Peter Serlin stepped down from his role due to health reasons. I would like to thank Peter for his contribution over the last four years and wish him a speedy recovery and good luck with his future ventures.



Wendy Cousins, who looked after the Rainforest Cub Accounts, and Val Rogan, who was part of our fundraising committee, have decided to step down from their roles and I would like to thank them both for their dedicated contribution to scouting in Abbots Langley. Joanna Sawika has also stepped down from her role as Health and Safety Officer. She also held the position of Group Secretary for a short while and I would like to thank her for her five years continuous service.

Our long standing Cub Leader, Chris Frith, has hung up his gold scarf after 35 years. Chris will be sadly missed by all of his Cubs over the years. Indeed, one of his original Cubs, Iain Stanley, who is now a GSL in Aylesbury, is testimony to Chris' success as a Cub leader. Thank you Chris, on behalf of the Group, for your tireless commitment and dedication to Abbos over the years and to scouting in general.

I would like to also give special thanks to our Executive Committee and Active Support who have helped out over the past twelve months. In particular Pauline, Iain, Alison and Dave Collette who have helped me steady the ship these past, very turbulent, seven months.

Next year, I will have been Group Chairman for ten years and I have decided that next May's AGM will be my last. For about twelve months now I have been considering my role as Chairman and had even discussed stepping down from the role with Clive. I feel this is a fitting time to let someone else bring new ideas to the Group and take it to the next phase of its existence. I am very happy to inform you that Richard Gabriel will be supporting me for the next seven months with a view to take over as Chairman at May's AGM. I look forward to working with Richard during this time, as he learns the ropes and am confident that he has the commitment and energy needed to move the Group forward.

I would like to close by recognising and thanking each and every one of you for the tremendous effort and time given to Scouting whether you are a member of the Leadership Team, Active Support, Ladies Guild, Executive Committee, District and County Scout Associations or Parents. You all contribute to our young peoples' participation in the adventure of a lifetime. I give you all a tremendous thank you and a very big well done!

# Group Scout Leader and Scout Leader Annual Report 2020

The total Group membership at the 2020 Census was 149 (2019 = 160). The individual section numbers were:

The Lagoon Beaver Colony closed in the July of 2019 meaning a reduction in the number of Beaver Scouts. However, the increase overall in Beavers passing through the ranks has ultimately increased the numbers in the Scout Troop.

There were 4 additions to the adult leadership team. Having completed 4 years as a Young Leader with Rainforest Cubs, Hannah Stephenson took on the adult role of Section Assistant. Nicola Trotman has returned to Cubs after a break from scouting and is now an Assistant Cub Scout Leader with Rainforest Cubs. Richard, Paul, Louise and Suli still remain part of the Cub team but Cheryl remains on maternity leave and sadly we have had to say farewell to Chris Frith a long standing Cub Leader.

After suspending Lake Beavers for a year, due to lack of leaders, we re-launched the Colony in January 2019 on a Saturday morning with Dani Chalk as the Beaver Leader and the addition of Stacy Ward as Assistant Beaver Scout Leader. Geeta Agarwal also took out an appointment as an ABSL with River Beavers, but sadly only stayed a term. I am pleased to welcome back to Beavers, Helen Welch after the birth of her son Lennon. Helen Is still supported by Rachel and Lin.

A few leaders stepped down from active involvement and thanks go to Dave Goodman, Aisling Benson and Karen Taylor for their support over the years.

A big thank you to all our Group members who were involved in the various fundraising activities in the Autumn proving that parents being more involved in fundraising resulted in a much greater turnout of helpers.

I would like to express my thanks to all our volunteers who ran the successful jumble sales this year raising essential funds for the Group.

The District Camp held in June was a huge success with 60 of our Cubs, Scouts and Young Leaders camping and having a fabulous weekend of activities and fun. A great time was also had by the leaders and parents that go involved and supported the event. Thanks to all of the adults that helped with setting up, camping and breaking camp.

The Village Carnival is one of our main fundraising events of the year and was very well supported. Thanks to all those who assisted in what was a long, albeit windy, very successful day. The continued help from those on the parent assistance rota is tremendous as the workload is a much easier when spread over a lot more adults. Well done also to all the Scouts who helped with the litter picking on the Sunday morning after the carnival. We were complimented by the carnival organisers.

Awards - the summer term was particularly busy at Scout Camp, where a total of 34 Challenge Awards were completed as well as numerous Nights Away, Hikes Away and Time on the Water activity badges.

Our Pack has remained somewhat stable in terms of its size and demographic over the past c18 months since the last AGM of May 2019, in the Summer Term of 2019 we had a total of 29 Cubs made up of 19 Male and 10 Female Youth Members, this Term (Autumn 2020) we have 27 Cubs made up of 16 Male and 11 Female Youth Members. A total decline of 2 Youth Member during this period but again an increase in the Pack's Female Youth demographic on the previous year. Such a continued and stable Pack size and diversity of membership reflects not only the success of our Group locally but also the benefits of Scouting Nationally to Young People as we continue to grow and diversify and offer an increasing array of new, exciting and adventurous activities shaped by the needs and input of Young People. With two successful Beaver Colonies in our Group and an extensive waiting list, we hope to continue to promote and facilitate Cub Scouting in a physical and virtual form to an increasing number of Young People within the local community over the coming year.

Rainforest Cubs Leadership Team has decreased over the last year with now 5 Volunteer Leaders, following Chris Frith's recent decision to sadly not return to Scouting and step down from his long-served role as Rainforest Cub Scout Leader. We'd like to thank Chris for his continued service to the growth and success of both the Rainforest Cub Pack and 1<sup>st</sup> Abbots Langley, 3<sup>rd</sup> North Watford Scout. I am pleased to take on the role of Cub Scout Leader for the Rainforest Cub Pack having progressed through the movement and been a member of the Pack as a Cub myself with Chris as the Cub Scout Leader at the time. I am excited to continue to build upon and develop these successes and facilitate an exciting and adventurous programme.

The Pack currently has 2 Young Leaders assisting toward the Volunteering Sections of their DofE programmes, in addition to 3 parents/ex-parents who assist the running of our Section in a variety of ways. Newly for this year Cub Scouting ventured into the virtual realm and we are pleased to have offered, although slightly later than most a number of Pack meetings through Zoom during the later part of the Summer Term and over the course of the Summer Holiday, to continue to provide some form of Scouting and platform for the connection of the shared experiences and friendship within the Pack, in addition to a form of 'escape' during the prolonged and unsettling experienced of all during the national lockdown and rather sudden and abrupt suspension of physical Cub Pack meetings. With an average attendance of 7 Cubs and being accessed by a total of 12 Cubs across the period we delivered virtual activities including; a scavenger hunt, bingo, pub style quiz and cake in a mug. All of which proved very successful and we hope to build upon the knowledge and experience learnt from these with our future virtual meetings planned for this (Autumn) Term.

We had hoped to facilitate a weekend long virtual Camp in the Summer Holidays although were forced to cancel this due to lack of interest, a number of Cubs did however attend the Scouts virtual Camp and others achieved Nights Away camping in their garden's and dens or blanket forts indoors during lockdown.

Cubs have through many of these physical and virtual activities and visits been able to complete a host of badgework including: Our Adventure Challenge Award, Our Outdoor Challenge Award, Our World Challenge Badge, Teamwork Challenge Award, Navigator Stage II Staged Activity Badge, Artist Activity Badge, Backwoods Cooking Activity Badge, Fire Safety Activity Badge, Home Help Activity Badge and Pioneer Activity Badge.

As we begin to resume face-to-face Scouting in small groups at outdoor venues with periodic virtual Pack meetings to safely facilitate the entire Pack we hope to continue to offer and provide Cubs the ability to obtain an extensive range of unique badges while undertaking new and exciting activities, adventures and experiences. Already this term we have had a couple of weeks at Whippendell Woods and Leavesden Country Park for some navigation and wide games and are working towards the Cubs Our Teamwork Challenge Award, Navigator Stage II Staged Activity Badge, Naturalist Activity Badge and Local Knowledge Activity Badge.

In addition to these various programmed activities and visits the Cubs have also over the year supported and attended a number of Group and District Events, including Watford North's St Georges Day Parade, Abbots Langley's Remembrance Day Parade, St Lawrence's Church Christingle Service and the Groups Jumble Sales. In June of 2019 around half of the Pack attended the much anticipated and enjoyed District Group Camp, a weekend camp held at Lees Wood taking part and engaging in a wide range of existing and adventurous activities and Wacky Olympics Competition.

In addition to the array of Challenge Award Staged Activity Badges and Activity Badges undertaken and completed by Cubs over the past c18 months, a total of 10 Cubs been able to complete their Chief Scouts Silver Award, the highest achievement in Cubs. # Jungle




We had an eventful 2020...
