

With Christmas day over, presents given and received, the excitement has ended and all that remains is the excess inches on the waist. These musings are not the sad thoughts of the lost or lonely, but the hearty chit chat of some 20-30 people meeting on Boxing Day morning to retread the steps of forefathers of the Abbots Langley Scouting movement who instigated the walk in 1950. Repeated in fair-weather or foul the walk crosses the lanes and paths from Abbots Langley to Potters Crouch and back again. This year was a special celebration for the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and the weather was exceptionally kind with bright sunshine, crisp snow all around and everyone in great spirits. The walking condition-ns were rather tricky for some who would opt to join the group later, but for those fit enough to cope, it really was a seasonal scene fit for the occasion.

We departed as always spot on 10.30 am from the top of Love Lane off towards the fields on the far side of East lane and on to the crossings over the Motorways. The numbers were 20 on departure, and as the walk continued late comers caught up and the numbers swelled. We strolled through a number of farms and on the bridges waved at the traffic, not entirely in keeping with the original walk as the route was adapted to take into account the motorways which didn't exist at the time. Merry beeps and

waves from below were sent back and we progressed to a vital point in the route. This was "Kitty Corner" where photos were taken and cash collected for the traditional beverage at the nearby Holly Bush Pub. We hastened in the direction of the hostelry where we met those who could not make the walk and en masse entered to be greeted by many locals and visitors from afar, many seen only on this day each year.

Once the bones had warmed up, the voices needed to follow, and as the count went on 1, 2, 3, 4 ... the whole pub became quiet for a toast to "absent friends" and the first of the afternoon's songs burst forth appropriately "The Holly Bush song" followed by many Christmas Carols and finally traditional songs passed on from our elders around many camp fires and long journeys in years gone by. Pavarotti can rest in peace, Songs of Praise may not want to visit, but there's no disputing that the singing in the Holly Bush would put many a church to shame, with its full and hearty voices bringing all of the pub together as one - sometimes in tune, sometimes not - but always in harmony (in the true sense of the word). Time runs away as always and at approx 1.45 the walkers regrouped to set off along the long lanes to Bedmond which were extremely icy this year and saw many, full of good cheer, take a tumble. Usually a quick stop at the White Hart to say hello is in order, but not this year as unoccupied it stood eerily lifeless, and thus to the Bell where the walking stops again for a short time while old friends chatter and really late arrivals can catch up. As day turns to night, one by one the party depletes and most are heading back to Abbots Langley to complete the walk, some are collected from there to travel to all parts near and far to be reunited with family or friends and not seen again until next year. New friendships are made each year and as people come more and more this very special reunion is reinforced. I have no doubt it will continue for many years to come, and evolve as it has in the past, but the best spirit of Christmas, is experienced by many out in the cold, on a walk in the country, on Boxing Day.

### River Beavers




Would you like to know what's been going on in The River Beavers over the last few months?
