

Chairman's Blog



The awards were presented on the final evening of the Scout Spring Programme by Dave Collette (North Watford District Commissioner). Well done all of you on achieving the highest award in Scouts. Zara James, aged 8, formerly belonging to one of our Beaver lodges but now moved up into Cubs was selected by the Abbots Langley Parish Council as "young person of the year" and awarded a cup in recognition. Very well done Zara.

We have unfortunately had to say goodbye to Amaelia Parmenter who, for work and personal reasons, resigned from her role as Scout Leader at the end of the spring term. I wish to thank Amaelia for stepping up at the outset and agreeing to take on a very demanding role. We wish Amaelia well in all her future ventures and trust she will want to continue her involvement with the Scouts. We hope there may be an opportunity for Amaelia to renew her association with our Scout Group again at some later stage.

lain Stanley has been very generous with his time and in giving us the benefit of his Scout knowledge for the benefit of the Group Exec. Iain also agreed to take on the role of Group Scout Leader, albeit temporarily, until another full time GSL could be found. After almost 2 years, Iain is stepping back from his close involvement with our Group in order that he can concentrate fully upon his own Scout Group. We asked Scouts at District level if they could give Iain some form of official recognition for his work on behalf of our Group. I am pleased to report that the County Commissioner has presented Iain with a Commendation.

Two new members to the Group, Yvonne Stanley (Hall bookings) and Jeremy Bishop (Transport) have both been energetic in pursuing their individual responsibilities and brought in additional funds to the Group. Thank you both.

The finances of the Group are overall in good shape. I wish to thank Pauline Styles, our Group Treasurer for all her hard work in organising and keeping abreast of the Group's finances. Pauline is currently on a long-distance walking trek in Spain. We wish her well on her travels. The costs of ongoing maintenance and further potential improvements to our building and facilities are expensive. We will be running our popular hot dog stall at the Abbots Langley Carnival in June, the return of our Double Jumble Sale in October and the Christmas Market in November. Lin Lythaby, after many years of organising fund raising will now take a step back. We are looking to introduce a new team of fund raisers to take over the reins from Lin.

I am delighted to announce the imminent receipt of a grant of £1,000 for the maintenance of the climbing wall from the Tescos Community Grant Scheme, achieving 2nd place in the 'shop and drop a token' scheme in their local branches of Tesco's. Thank you to all those who dropped their token into our box.

Unfortunately, in common with other Scout and similar youth groups we currently have a shortage of leaders which, if not resolved urgently, will prevent us from maintaining the present membership level and ability to accommodate the increasing numbers of young people on the waiting list. I am immensely grateful to the parents and other helpers who, in the interim, have stepped up to help overcome the shortage of leaders. Without this essential extra assistance from parents and from members of the Scout Active Support unit and the Explorers Unit our leaders will find it increasingly difficult to cope. This could result in even fewer leaders and smaller sections. We do need to maintain and to build upon this additional help going forward and I ask those of you who may possibly be interested in either training to become a leader or can assist in some other way to contact either myself or their child's Section leader to learn more about how you can help.

Similarly, the Group is in urgent need of finding additional people to help run the Exec Committee who oversee the day to day running of the Scout Group and its facilities. Vacancies exist for a Group Secretary, Health & Safety and Fund-Raising Coordinators and a Facilities Manager. These are all important roles that are fundamental to the successful running of the Group. Rewarding opportunities exist for those interested in taking on interesting and challenging roles to augment the Group Exec. These vacant roles have previously been advertised in Woodsmoke including brief descriptions of what the posts entail. I acknowledge that, at first reading, the full job descriptions may appear daunting but please, please do not allow this to put you off finding out more about what is involved and how you may be able to help. There may be elements of the role that might appeal or which you believe you might be particularly good at. We are open to looking into ways of tailoring an individual's involvement to suit their personal capacity for helping the Group.
